The 2024 Imagine A Way Award Honors Carol & Richard Gerken

The Imagine A Way Award is given each year at ETC to an individual, individuals, or organization who has, through their vision and spirit, made a profound difference in the Plymouth community. Given in honor of Dr. Sara Jayne Steen, President Emerita of Plymouth State University, and her late husband Joseph Bourque, the award was created to honor the many contributions Sara Jayne and Joe made to both Plymouth State University and to the greater Plymouth community. Their kindness, genuine caring, and tireless efforts on behalf of others will forever serve as a model for those who follow.

This Award is given each year to community members who have gone the extra mile and given tirelessly of themselves to the community and to ETC.

I have known the Gerkens for many years. As long-time supporters of Plymouth State University, they have been in the audience of many ETC productions over the years. In addition to being audience members, they have also been constant supporters, helping us to keep ETC funded so that we can continue to weave the magic with the help of the community.

In the recent pass, the Gerkens gave a \$25,000 Matching Gift to ETC. This single gift, which the community matched, along with the generosity of Alex Ray and the business support of the University, enabled the production of *Guys and Dolls* this past January. In addition to their financial help, however, the Gerkens have also given generously of their time and expertise to our fundraising efforts, essential to the sustainability of many arts organizations.

In addition to Carol and Richard's generous donations to ETC, TIGER, and the Raise the Curtain fund at PSU, they have also given to the Children's Library Collection at Lamson Library, the Women's Ice Hockey Locker Room, the Multi-Purpose Field Scoreboard, the Museum of the White Mountains and have funded multiple scholarships at Plymouth State University. Most recently, they pledged to support the Hyde Hall building renovation project, where Richard taught as an Adjunct Professor for 12 years.

Their donations to other nonprofit organizations include the Page Pond and Forest Conservation Campaigns, the Meredith Community Center, CASA, the Laverack Nature Trail at Hawkins Brook, the Meredith Library Fund, the Meredith Veterans Memorial, the Greater Meredith Program, the Lakes Region VNA & Hospice, the Meredith Historical Society, the Loon Preservation Committee, the NH Charitable Foundation, the NH Master Chorale, the NH Music Festival, the Trinity Episcopal Church and the Mercy Home for Boys and Girls in Chicago, IL.

Richard and Carol also undertake an amazing amount of community service. Richard is past President of the Meredith Rotary Club and serves as Secretary of the Meredith Planning Board. He also serves as President of the PORA Homeowners Association, as a CASA Volunteer (Court Appointed Special Advocate for Neglected and Abused Children), as Co-Chair of the Meredith Community Center Committee and as a member of the Meredith Capital Improvements Committee (Town Budget Committee). He is currently chairing a committee authorized by the Select Board reviewing and updating Town of Meredith ordinances and regulations regarding short-term property rentals.

Carol is past President of the Altrusa International Club of Meredith, as well as past President of the Community Garden Club of Meredith and past member of the Lakes Board of the NH Charitable Foundation.

She has served on many community organizations, including as a member of the Meredith Pathways Committee, the Greater Meredith Program Fundraising Committee, the Museum of the White Mountains Advisory Committee, and the Steering Committee for Meredith's 250th Committee. Carol is a Graduate of Leadership Lakes Region, Co-Chair of the Page Pond and Forest Fundraising Campaign and a Board member of the Lakes Center for the Arts. Carol was also a Founding member of the President's Council at Plymouth State University, serving five three-year terms.

Thank you, Carol and Richard. Thank you for your belief in ETC and all it means to the community. Your kindness, generosity and friendship has made all the difference.

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Choosing an ETC production is such an important part of the process for me. When I chose *Gypsy*, I had no idea it would be the last production I would direct for ETC. I had originally planned on directing one more in 2025 to make my 30-year anniversary, but when my mobility was badly impacted due to severe arthritis in my hip, the stress of fundraising (which I have always hated) became too much, and when my husband of 39 years retired unexpectedly, it seemed clear to me that 2024 was the year.

If Covid hadn't struck, causing us to lose a year and an ETC production, this would have been the 30th production, after all, and I think my body is ready to stop, even if my spirit still burns. Although it is bittersweet, I am at peace with my decision, especially because of the willingness of Fran Page and Jule Finley to step into my role going forward. They are both exceptional individuals with great talent and love for community, theatre, and ETC. Thank you from the bottom of my heart Fran and Jule!

Gypsy is an amazing piece of musical theatre to end my run on, and I have always loved it, for the music and the characters and the story. It was a production we could fit in the space; I thought it was a musical we could cast, and I believed it would appeal to our audiences after the success of *Guys and Dolls*. When I recalled that the illustrious Flying Monkey had once been a vaudeville theatre, the idea of producing *Gypsy* seemed just right.

At its heart, *Gypsy* is a story about the need for recognition, and the relationship between a driven, ambitious mother and her two talented daughters. As with other vaudeville performers, Madame Rose, June, and Louise travel from one vaudeville theatre to another, living on the road, just like the real Hovick Family upon which the story is based. It is subtitled, a Musical Fable, so not everything in the production is true, but it is a great story, nevertheless, which audiences have enjoyed for over 60 years. It's almost as old as I am!

Beginning in the 1880s and running through the 1920s, vaudeville was the most popular form of entertainment in the US and Canada, with more than 25,000 performers making their living traipsing across the country from vaudeville house to vaudeville house. Just imagine The Flying Monkey itself almost 100 years ago and what it must have been like! Today's performance of *Gypsy* will attempt to take us back to those glorious days of vaudeville, where ten to fifteen different acts were performed on a stage just like the Flying Monkey for an adoring public.

Because we have such a great projections designer in Kylee Loera and the talent of Timm Judas to design and build the set pieces needed, I knew we could create the multitude of scenic settings for *Gypsy*. With the inventive lighting of Peter Liebold, the costumes assembled by the great Janet Reidy through renting, borrowing, and creating, the amazing musical direction by Harmony Markey, the exciting choreography by Broadway veteran Gustavo Wons, and the fantastic stage management and props of Kristen

Wettstein, I knew we had the creative talent we needed. This, along with the orchestra, other talented ETC and Flying Monkey staff, my direction, and, of course, most importantly, our wonderful and versatile cast, and voilà — we bring you our 2024 ETC Production of *Gypsy*.

I am so grateful to all my creative collaborators, our sponsors and donors, this incredible cast, and of course *you*, our audience. Simply put, we couldn't do this without you. We look forward to sharing what many theatre professionals consider the finest musical ever created, *Gypsy*. We hope we can do it justice.

So, sit back, relax, and join us for our 29th ETC production — Gypsy. Thank you for being here and for your continued belief in the power of the arts. It has been an honor and a privilege to create with you over nearly three decades.



Trish Lindberg, (Producing Artistic Director) — Trish is professor and coordinator of the MEd in Integrated Arts program at PSU, and co-founder, with Professor Emeritus of Music Dan Perkins, of the award-winning Educational Theatre Collaborative (ETC), celebrating its 29th season. She is also co-founder (with Gail Mears, Gary Goodnough, and Kate Mausolf) of Theatre Integrating Guidance, Education, and Responsibility (TIGER), an Emmy®-Award-winning professional theatre company that has performed for more than half a million children throughout New England with its original musical productions on social issues faced by children in our schools today.

Lindberg's work has been recognized with the Governor's Arts and Education Award, the NETC Moss Hart Trophy for Best Overall Production (twice), the Youth Theatre Director of the Year Award from the American Alliance for Theatre and Education (AATE), a regional Emmy® for TIGER Takes on Bullying (co-produced with NHPTV) and the PSU Distinguished Teaching Award. The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and the Council for Advancement and Support of Education also named Lindberg the New Hampshire Professor of the Year, selecting her from over 400 top professors in the United States. In addition, she has won a New Hampshire Excellence in Education (EDies) Award from the New Hampshire Department of Education and the New Hampshire Humanities Council named Lindberg one of the "40 over 40" New Hampshire citizens who over the past 40 years have demonstrated what it means to create, teach, lead, assist, and encourage human understanding. Recently, Trish was thrilled to be named the 2021-2023 Stevens-Bristow Distinguished Scholar at Plymouth State University.

Lindberg has directed more than 100 productions for family audiences, including many original productions, as well as performances in Ireland, England, South Africa, Lithuania, France, Egypt, New Zealand, Palestine, China, and Poland. Her original short play *Bystander Blues* and her adaptation of *Pollyanna* with music by William Ögmundson, were published by Dramatic Publishing, Inc. and continue to be performed nationally and internationally. Trish founded and directed the Kearsarge Arts Theatre (KAT) for thirty years, founded the St. Martins' Summer Theatre in St. Martins, New Brunswick, Canada, and worked with Fidaa Ataya, William Ögmundson, Steve Low, and Yusuf Aboudi to establish the Palestinian-American Children's Theatre (PACT) in Ramallah, Palestine, creating an original musical performance with children from eight different schools in Ramallah.

Trish counts herself extremely fortunate to spend time with the many exceptional individuals onstage and off who make up the Educational Theatre Collaborative (ETC), and will miss it very much when she moves on to other adventures after *Gypsy*. She is always amazed at what can be accomplished in less than three weeks, when people are able to share their different talents and work together to create magic.

BEHIND THE CURTAIN

The Making of America's Striptease Queen: How Louise Hovick became Gypsy Rose Lee

When playwright Arthur Laurents was pitched to write the book for a musical about Gypsy Rose Lee, he wasn't interested.

"I didn't care about the Striptease Queen of America," Laurents reminisced in a 2007 interview, when he was 90. "One of the producers said, 'Well, think about it, you'll come up with something.' And finally, I decided on the mother."

And so the star of *Gypsy* isn't the celebrated Gypsy Rose Lee. It's the indomitable Rose Hovick, the mother of all stage mothers. To see her daughters' names in lights she dreamed and connived, pushed and finagled, schemed and scrimped.

Rose has been called the King Lear of musical theater — blind to her own true nature and oblivious of others'. Over the past 65 years the best of the genre's leading ladies have played the part: Ethel Merman, Angela Lansbury, Tyne Daly, Bernadette Peters, Rosalind Russell, Bette Midler, and Patti LuPone.

But how close to the truth is Laurents' script? After all, he subtitled it "A Musical Fable."

The real-life relationships between Rose and her daughters can never be fully known but there are plenty of clues. "Mother... was ruthless," Gypsy Rose Lee wrote in her memoir. "She was in her own words a jungle mother, and she knew too well that in a jungle it doesn't pay to be nice."

June Havoc defended their mother. *Gypsy* was "one of the most smashing shows I've seen in my life," she said in one interview, "but [it had] very little to do with the facts. My mother was not such a monster."

It is a fact, though, that barely into her teens June escaped from Rose by marrying a boy in the troupe. It's also true that the legendary Billy Minsky posted a sign in his burlesque house warning THE MOTHER OF MISS GYPSY ROSE LEE IS NOT ALLOWED BACKSTAGE AT THIS THEATER.

Rose may not have satisfied her own stifled ambition, but she succeeded with her daughters. Louise, a gawky, ugly-duckling of a girl, reinvented herself as the most celebrated stripper ever — a sexy, witty performer whose shtick was more tease than strip. The real Gypsy Rose Lee lived large in a 26-room Manhattan townhouse and drove a Rolls Royce.

June had a long and successful (if not top-tier) career as the actress June Havoc. She wrote a book that became a Broadway play, winning her a Tony nomination for best direction — a first for a woman.

The sisters quarreled bitterly over the way *Gypsy* portrayed June, reconciling just before Louise's death from lung cancer in 1970. June survived well into her 90s, but never outlived the fear that her obituaries would identify her primarily as Gypsy Rose Lee's sister. And so they did.

SYNOPSIS

Gypsy opens on a seedy vaudeville stage in pre-Depression Seattle. A motley collection of young performers line up to audition for Uncle Jocko's Kiddie Show. Jocko banishes all stage mothers from the theater but Rose Horvick doesn't play by the rules.

Rose's aging father, whose wife has abandoned the family, urges her to settle down. That's fine for "Some People," Rose sings, but "some people ain't me!" To pay for costumes and scenery she pawns Grampa's "gold" retirement plaque.

On the way to L.A., Rose kidnaps some boys to round out a new act. She enchants Herbie, an itinerant candy salesman. Soon Rose and Herbie are dueting in "Small World," a ballad packed with timeless pickup lines.

Baby June and Her Newsboys, as the new act is billed, features June singing "Let Me Entertain You" while gawky Louise is relegated to the newsboy chorus. As the troupe celebrates Louise's birthday with Chinese takeout, Herbie introduces Mr. Goldstone of the Orpheum Theater vaudeville circuit. ("I Love You, Mr. Goldstone")

Herbie pleads with Rose to give up her show-biz dreams and marry him. When he threatens to walk Rose scoffs, "You'll Never Get Away from Me."

In New York the proprietor of Grantziger's Palace recognizes

June's talent and offers to train her as an actress...as long as Rose stays out of the picture. That's a deal-breaker, of course.

But the Depression has arrived, vaudeville is dying, the talkies are stealing audiences. The sisters sing a mutual wish, "If Momma Was Married." Meanwhile, Tulsa, the handsomest of the boy dancers, secretly works out his own act. "All I Need Is the Girl," he croons to Louise, who momentarily shares his fantasy.

Rose is shocked when June runs away with Tulsa. But a new ambition comes to her in a dream: She'll make Louise a star. Louise is skeptical, but Roses promises that "Everything's Coming Up Roses."

Act 2 opens with a rehearsal of a new all-girl act. Louise is ready to quit show biz, but Rose and Herbie cheer her up with "Together, Wherever We Go." Tellingly, their next booking is a burlesque house — the graveyard of washed-up vaudeville acts.

A trio of strippers share their professional secrets ("You Gotta Get a Gimmick"). Rose declares Louise will never strip. But when one of the strippers is arrested, Rose, flat broke, volunteers Louise to fill in. Disgusted, Herbie calls off a wedding, permanently.

Louise mentions that Grandpa says the family moves around like gypsies, so the announcer introduces her as Gypsy Rose Lee. After a stiff start, Louise's confidence builds as she realizes her impact on the audience. Before long she's getting top billing at major houses across the country.

Rose feels more and more useless and out of control. The long-simmering showdown erupts in a dressing room at Minsky's. Gypsy Rose declares her independence, Rose explodes with "What did I do it all for?" Louise responds quietly: "I thought you did it for me."

Gypsy's final scene brings Rose to the naked truth. On a bare stage below a marquee with her name winking out, she sings "Rose's Turn," a defiant what-might-have-been hallucination: "Everything's coming up roses...this time for me! For me!"

Louise, watching from the shadows, is moved.



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



ETC EDUCATIONAL THEATRE COLLABORATIVE





The Educational Theatre Collaborative (ETC) was founded in the fall of 1994 by Professor of Integrated Arts Trish Lindberg and Professor of Music Emeritus Dan Perkins with the support of Plymouth State University, Plymouth Elementary School, and Plymouth Friends of the Arts. The goal of ETC is to produce the highest quality theatre and integrated arts experiences possible through collaborations with PSU, area schools, and the community.

ETC is an inclusive organization interested in reaching out to the community. Activities include graduate courses, community arts workshops, an integrated arts conference for teachers, a five-day summer theatre camp for children, and the annual January production.

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Theatre Integrating Guidance, Education, and Responsibility (TIGER) is a powerful and exciting collaboration between the integrated arts and counselor education graduate programs at Plymouth State University. TIGER is designed to help children, schools, parents, and communities deal proactively and positively with social issues and concerns faced by young people today. TIGER offers a variety of productions incorporating live actors, original scripts, music, and choreography designed to engage K–12 school audiences.

Seen by over half a million children across New England, **TIGER** has been invited to perform at the state, regional, national, and international levels. In 2012, **TIGER** filmed an original television pilot on bullying in collaboration with NHPTV, and won a Regional Emmy® for the production of *TIGER Takes On Bullying*.

During the pandemic, **TIGER** created a new online program called **TURBO TIGER**, so that schools could still safely enjoy **TIGER**. Now back on the road, **TIGER** received rave reviews for its two original musical productions in 2021–2022 *Kindness Counts* and *Brand New Day*. In 2022–2024, **TIGER** mounted two additional original musicals, *Team Up Together*, and our exciting collaboration with the Jesse Lewis Choose Love Movement — *Choose Love: The Musical*, both for K–6 audiences. In our 2023–2024 season, TIGER also added an original production for Grades 7–12, *Triggered*, about one person's struggle with addiction.

The Dennise Maslakowski Graduate Education Scholarship Fund


